# Rules & Regulations - Rural Ambassador Award

- Open to ambassadors aged between 20 and 30 years as of the 1st May 2025 and the finalist must reside in Victoria.
- Each Show can run a Rural Ambassador Show qualifier and the winner at Show Level then
  represents the Show at the Group Final.
- An ambassador having won at their local Show Level is not eligible to enter any other Show or represent another group.
- A maximum of 12 finalists will be eligible for the State Final with preference to all Group Final winners and each runner up of each group will be considered. If numbers exceed 12 finalist's interviews will be held at the information day to determine the remaining State Finalists.
- The State Final is held at the Melbourne Royal Show and each finalist is judged based on the criteria below.
- Each Finalist will need to supply a resume with a cover letter and a draft/copy of speech
  for the State Final, which will be given to the judges of the State Final.
- Each Finalist will be interviewed by a panel of three judges and the State Finalist will need to present at speech at the presentation luncheon. The winner will be announced at the presentation luncheon.

# **Judging Criteria**

- Local Show Involvement (25 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Show Society.
- Community Involvement (20 Points) Entrants must demonstrate an active involvement and a desire to be involved in the future and improvement of their Local Community.

Also, entrants are expected to demonstrate effective communication skills written, oral and interpersonal.
- Ambitions/Goals/Interests (15 Points) Each Entrants ambitions and goals will be
  assessed on their integrity and relevance to the award. Entrants must demonstrate steps
  towards achieving their goal.
- Style, Grooming & Presentation (10 Points) Entrants presentation will be assessed according to the suitability of their attire and conduct in a range of contexts.
- Conduct (10 Points) How the entrant behaves and demonstrates appropriate behaviour in each setting eg. being polite, well dressed and soft spoken.
- Public Presentation (3-minute speech) (20 Points) Entrants public presentation will be
  assessed according to the quality of the content, delivery and the extent to which it
  addresses the set topic.

# Ingredients:

- 375g Plain Flour
- 2 tsp Baking Powder
- 1 ½ tsp bicarb soda
- 2 tsp ground cinnamon
- ½ tsp ground nutmeg
- ½ tsp allspice
- Pinch of salt
- 345 g castor sugar
- 350 ml vegetable oil
- 4 eggs
- 3 medium carrots, grated (350 grams)
- 220 g tin crushed pineapple, drained
- 180 g pecan nuts crushed

### Method:

- Preheat the oven to 180C (160C fan), Grease a 23cm (9") round cake tin and line with baking paper.
- 2. Sift the dry ingredients together into a bowl. In a separate bowl, beat the eggs and oil, then add to the dry ingredients. Mix well then add the carrots, crushed pineapple and pecans. Mix to form a smooth batter and pour into the cake tin.
- 3. Bake for approximately 90 100 minutes.
- 4. Remove from the oven and allow to cool for 10 minutes in the tin on a wire rack.

  Upend and allow to cool on the wire rack.

### **Boiled Fruit Cake:**

Ingredients:

- 375g Mixed Fruit
- 1/2 cup Sherry
- 3/4 cup Brown Sugar
- 2 eggs lightly beaten
- 1 teaspoon Mixed Spice
- 2 tablespoons Marmalade
- 1/2 cup Water
- 1 cup Self Raising Flour
- 125g Butter
- 1 cup Plain Flour
- 1/2 teaspoon Bicarbonate of Soda
- 1/4 teaspoon Salt.

### Method:

Place the mixed fruit, sugar, spice, water and butter in a large saucepan and bring to the boil

Simmer gently for 3 minutes, then removed from stove, add bicarb soda and allow to cool. Add the Sherry, eggs and marmalade, mixing well.

Fold in the sifted dry ingredients, then place in a greased and lined 20cm **ROUND** tin. Bake in a moderately slow oven for 1.5 hours, or until cooked when tested.

# VICTORIAN AGRICULTURAL SHOWS LIMITED COMPETITIONS CONDUCTED BY V.A.S. LTD INC REGULATIONS

- 1. State level.
- 2. A person will not be permitted to win at more than one Show within the State In any one Show year. Persons not adhering to this rule will be required to forfeit/refund prize money.
- 3. An article having won at the Show will compete at a group final, the winning article will then compete at the next Royal Melbourne Show.
- 4. An article having won a State Final is no longer eligible to compete in the competition.
- 5. Each article entered must be bona fide work of the exhibitor.
- 6. If for any reason a winner is unable to compete at Group or State level then a second placegetter is eligible to compete.
- 7. Items in section S11, S23, S56, S72 and S74 must be the same as won at local show and group.
- 8. All work to have been completed within the last twelve (12) months.

# GENERAL REGULATIONS

- All general entries must be made in writing and lodged with the Secretary, St. Arnaud, all sections have closing times stated, please adhere to these. All entries will be finally closed for this exhibition as stated.
- At the time of entry, the Class and Section in which it is intended to exhibit must be stated and signed by or for the exhibitor. A ticket for each exhibit will be given by the secretary at the time of entry, which must accompany the exhibit when placed and no entry will be received without such ticket.
- Everything exhibited for a prize, except livestock, vehicles, machinery and implements must be
  produced or manufactured in Australia. All exhibits must be the bona-fide property of, and in the
  possession of, the exhibitor, and all farm and dairy produce must be grown or made by the
  exhibitor, and of last season's crop.
- 4. Entries will not be restricted in any Section (excepting Sections M and O) and if any exhibitor is awarded a second prize in addition to a first, with the same exhibit, such prizes will be paid (except where otherwise stated).
- Exhibitors can compete with the same entry in as many Sections as they may choose, but on winning a first prize cannot compete again, except in special or champion prizes, and where otherwise specified in the Schedule.
- 6. Exhibits which cannot be shown in any competing Class may be exhibited as extras.
- 7. The Society invites the exhibition of articles other than those for which prizes are offered, and the judges may recommend prizes to those thought worthy, the said recommendation to be considered at the next monthly meeting of the Committee.
- 8. No prize can be awarded for extra exhibits if the prize list contains a Class or Section in which the same can compete.
- Should any exhibit, having gained a prize, be disqualified, the next on the list does not
  necessarily obtain the same prize. The Committee, with or without the advice of the judges, shall
  decide the question.
- 10. The judges may award a second or third prize instead of a first prize, or may withhold a prize altogether where there is only one exhibit, or where the exhibits are not considered worthy.
- 11. The Committee may withhold any prize when statements have been erroneously or fraudulently made regarding any exhibit, and exhibitors guilty of false entries or statements may be debarred from again exhibiting and, if members, will be liable to expulsion.
- 12. In the judging ring, stewards are requested to keep aloof from the judges while they are engaged in adjudication and to make no remarks whatsoever to them on the merits of the exhibits or any of the exhibits.

- 13. The Committee shall have the power at any time to disqualify any exhibits for any reason which shall appear to the Committee to warrant such disqualification, whether a protest or complaint be lodged or not.
- 14. Any dispute as to the interpretation of these regulations shall be determined by the Committee, whose decision shall be final and conclusive.
- 15. If, in the opinion of the stewards, the conduct of any exhibitor or any other person shall be such as to demand such a course, they shall have the power to forfeit any or all prizes such exhibitors may have won and may further cause such person or exhibitor and exhibit or exhibits to be re moved from the Showgrounds.
- 16. Any person refusing to attach a prize card on any exhibit to which the prize is awarded, and to keep the same on during the hours of exhibition, will, on proof thereof to the Committee, be disqualified from receiving all prizes awarded to the said person during the Show.
- 17. Any prize or prizes awarded by the Society at any of its exhibitions, and left unclaimed for a period of six months, may be forfeited and cancelled by the Committee of management.
- 18. All implements, machinery and other articles which will not be injured thereby, must be delivered in the yards between the hours of 10 o'clock in the forenoon and six o'clock in the afternoon of the day preceding the exhibition. Exhibits in all other Classes at 9:30am, if not otherwise stated.
- 19. Each exhibitor must place his exhibits in the proper Class where directed, with the ticket received from the Secretary, stating the Class, Section and Number in which his exhibit has been entered.
- 20. All horses, when being judged, are to be led, ridden or driven as directed by the judges.
- 21. The Committee reserves to itself the right of refusing to admit into the yard any animal which there is reason to suspect is either diseased or dangerous.
- 22. The Committee shall also have power to require that statutory declaration be made concerning any animal, or article, which it has reason to suppose is being exhibited contrary to the rules connected with the exhibition.
- 23. The decision of the judges shall be final with regard to all prizes offered, except in cases where protests are duly lodged with the secretary, as directed hereunder.
- 24. Any person insulting, or interfering with the judges during the Show will be subject to removal from the yards and the prizes (if any) awarded to him, forfeited.
- 25. No appeal against the decision of the judges will be entertained unless the same be made in writing, and lodged with the secretary before noon on the day following the Show, and a deposit of \$2 be made, which shall be forfeited if the Committee considers the appeal to be frivolous. Any exhibitor attempting to mislead the judges or stewards in any Class or Section, or competing in any Section, where he is not eligible according to the rules governing such Section, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$10, and disqualification. This will be strictly enforced.
- 26. In the event of any protest being received, the same will be considered immediately by the Stewards or, if this is not possible, by the Committee at the next Committee meeting.
- 27. No judge shall be an exhibitor in the department in which he is judge.
- 28. The Society will not hold itself responsible for the safe custody of exhibits, but every care will be taken of same during day of Show and following day.
- 29. Exhibitors are requested to have some person in charge of their exhibit, as no owner of the same will be allowed to be present during the adjudication by the judges (except where otherwise stated).
- 30. No persons, except members (and non-members upon payment of stated charge of admission) and those actually in charge of stock, implements or machinery and from whom an authority must be obtained, will be permitted to remain in the yards during the adjudication under any pretence whatever. The persons in charge must on no account leave their respective lots, or address the judges, unless authorized by the stewards of the exhibition.
- 31. Intending competitors are particularly requested to observe the time fixed for closing of the entries at this office, and also the hour fixed for receiving the exhibits on the morning of the Show, as these rules will be strictly enforced; and also, that no entry will be received unless accompanied by the entrance fee, or from a member whose subscription is paid for the current year.
- 32. Entry fees in all Sections are stated at the beginning of each Section details.

- Chief Steward and stewards in pavilion are eligible to enter, but are expressly excluded from speaking to the judges during judging.
- 34. Any infringement of these rules will disqualify exhibitors from taking any prizes awarded to them.
- In case of disputes as to the same, these shall be determined by the Committee of this Society, W.A.S.A. or V.A.S. Ltd.
- 36. The St. Arnaud Agricultural Society will not be responsible for any injury or loss incurred by an entrant or competitors. Any person participating in any activity related to the Show does so at his or her own risk.
- 37. In case of equal first, the first and second prize money will be combined and then divided equally between the equal first place getters. No second is given if there is equal first. If equal second, that prize money is shared. Where a ribbon or sash is involved, an extra one will be acquired and forwarded to the person concerned.
- 38. Hats and safety helmets.

Wearing a ASA approved helmet is compulsory for everyone competing on, working in or schooling or riding for any other reason a horse at a Show or in any area considered to be for whatever reason a part of the showground.

All riders must wear protective headgear, which includes a retaining harness secured to the shell at more than two points. Such headwear must be worn with the chinstrap properly adjusted and fastened when in the arena or ring, the practice area collecting rings or anywhere else within a showgrounds.

It is compulsory that all riders wear protective headwear conforming to the current Australian Standard or an equivalent standard and that the headwear be secured by a retention harness.

39. Animal Abuse.

Any alleged acts of animal abuse are reportable during the event to the organized body, supported by at least two other witnesses, of after the event to V.A.S. Ltd in writing. Two separate letters must be received in writing by V.A.S. Ltd from unrelated members or different families within fourteen (14) days of the date of the event, giving rise to the incident.

### NOTE:

Abuse can be defined as intentionally acting in a way that may cause pain or unnecessary discomfort to an animal. As examples, an act of abuse can be any of the following.

To whip or beat an animal excessively.

To subject an animal to any kind of electric shock devise.

To use spurs, or to jab an animal in the mouth with a bit or any other instrument, excessively or persistently.

To remount, or attempt to remount, an obviously exhausted, lame or injured animal.

To "Rap" a horse anywhere in or outside the grounds of the event.

To hyper sensitize any part of the animal.

To leave an animal without adequate food, drink or exercise.

41. No person who is in arrears with regard to entry fee, subscriptions, or any other Show charge is eligible to compete at any Show held by or affiliated with V.A.S. Ltd. Proof of payment will be required before any restriction will be lifted.

The St. Arnaud Agricultural Society Inc. is committed to providing a safe, healthy and environmentally acceptable Showground for all stakeholders.

We shall, so far as is practicable endeavor to comply with all statutory and Common Law requirements. All competitors and exhibitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to unsafe situations that could lead to injury.

# SAFETY REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS

**DUTY OF CARE** - all competitors have a "Duty of Care" to avoid exposing themselves or other people to situations that lead to injury. This "Duty of Care" extends to the prevention of damaged property

**DIRECTION OF ST. ARNAUD AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY INC** - Competitors must comply with any reasonable request of St. Arnaud Agricultural Society Inc. Representatives.

**EMERGENCY INFORMATION** - Emergency Information and maps showing Emergency Assembly Points are located in various buildings.

FIRST AID - During the St. Arnaud Show, First Aid is provided by qualified volunteers

# ST. ARNAUD AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY INC. EMERGENCY FACILITIES

Fire Fighting and other emergency equipment must not be removed or used for any other purpose. Missing or unserviceable equipment should be reported to Administration immediately.

**HAZARD & INCIDENT REPORTING** Competitors must notify the Area/Pavilion Supervisor or Administration immediately of any hazards detected or incidents. Hazards or incidents is any situation that could result or has resulted in

- (a) the injury, illness or death of any person or animal
- (b) The damage, destruction or loss of property

**WASTE DISPOSAL** - All waste, including liquids, must be disposed of responsibly. Storm rains must not be used for the disposal of waste.

**HOUSEKEEPING** - All areas must be kept clean and tidy with clearly defined and available access and exit routes at all times. Build up of combustible waste must be avoided.


SLIPS, TRIPS AND FALLS - Care must be taken to minimise trip hazards and obstacles that people may walk into. Avoid laying unprotected cables or pipes on or above paths, walk ways or roads

**MEDIA COMMENTS** - Media comments about matters involving St. Arnaud Agricultural Society Inc. or the Showgrounds is coordinated by the Administrator.

**SMOKING** - Smoking is not permitted inside buildings, within 10 metres of a building entrance, around combustibles, during public performances or while handling hazardous materials.

### **ELECTRICAL EOUIPMENT**

- (a) Competitors should supply their own "Safety Switch" (RCD) for installation at each power outlet they use.
- (b) Extension cords must be earthed and all electrical appliances must be earthed or double insulated. Appliances must be in sound working order.
- (c) The use of double adapters is strictly prohibited. Power boards must be fitted with current overload protection.
- (d) Radiant electric or gas heaters are prohibited.
- (e) Light sockets must not be used for any other purpose other than for lighting.
- (f) No naked flame permitted
- (g) All exhibitor electrical items (including leads) must have current safety compliance tags.



- Playing Cards (Nude or Lewd)
- Pressure Pack Fart Gas
- Pressure Pack Snow
- Pressure Pack Silly String
- Drug Related Goods (including Cocaine Kits, Bongs, etc.)
- Stink Bombs
- Water Pistols longer than 150mm
- Water Bombs
